### What happens at a Catholic funeral?

The Catholic funeral service is based on the teachings of the Bible and reflects Christian views on God and the afterlife. The service is designed to honour the life of the deceased and commend their soul to God, but also to provide support to the bereaved. The funeral rite also allows the deceased to be treated with respect and shows that everyone is special to God.

A funeral is an important event because it affirms belief in the resurrection of the body, which is important in Catholicism, while bringing the community together. It also allows believers the opportunity to consider what will happen when they die and to think about whether they are leading the kind of life that will allow them to enter Heaven.

There are important things that happen at a Catholic funeral:

- 1. The **Reception of the Body** is when the body is taken to the Church to represent the person being taken back to God. At the church doors, the coffin is sprinkled with holy water as a reminder of the person's baptism. The coffin is placed beside the lit Paschal Candle and white cloth called a pall is placed over the coffin which reminds us that we are all equal in the eyes of God.
- 2. The **funeral Mass** is often called a requiem which is Latin for rest. The priest will wear purple or white as a sign of repentance and forgiveness from sins. There are Bible readings that are about Jesus' death and resurrection. A phrase that is used in the prayer is "Grant that he/she who was united with your Son in a death like his, may be one with him in his resurrection.
- 3. The committal is at the grave site of the deceased. A prayer is said that any sins the person has committed will be forgiven. The coffin is sprinkled with holy water as a reminder of baptism. The priest waves incense over the coffin to represent the prayers being offered up to God on behalf of the deceased. A prayer is said for the mourners.
- 4. At the grave or crematorium, the people say the Our Father and other prayers. The grave is sprinkled with holy water.

### What are the different beliefs about ending a life?

Some people believe that people should be able to choose to end a life through abortion or euthanasia. These people may not think that life is sacred. They might think that if a person's quality of life is going to be poor when they are born it is ok for the woman to choose abortion or if a person's quality of life is poor during their life because they have a life-threatening illness, they should be able to choose when to die.

### What do Catholics believe about ending a human life?

Catholics believe that all human beings are made imago dei because in Genesis 1 it says, "God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them." Catholics believe this means that all life is sacred and belongs to God, this is called the sanctity of life principle. Catholics believe it is wrong to take a life because it says in the 10 Commandments 'Do not kill.' Catholics also believe that we had a relationship with God before we were born because in Jeremiah is says "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you." For these reasons Catholics believe abortion and euthanasia are wrong because they take a person's life.
