Inspired	'God breathed'; the belief that the Holy Spirit guides an individual to act or write what is good and true.
Dei Verbum	The Latin phrase for 'Word of God'; also a document from the Second Vatican Council explaining how Jesus is the Word of God.

Extended writing preparation:

How can Catholics help to bring about the Kingdom of God?

- What is the Kingdom of God? The spiritual realm over which God reigns as King and a time when all people live as God wants.
- How did Jesus treat people who were marginalised? Jesus treated everyone equally. People who were marginalised at the time of Jesus were outcasts. They included sinners, the ritually impure, gentiles, women, the neglected (such as widows) and the sick. Through his ministry, Jesus reached out to the marginalised groups, treating them with compassion and as equals.
- What did Jesus teach about the Kingdom of God? Jesus' parables tell use how God wants us to live. Jesus gave this message in a way that the people of his time could understand. The Parable of the Sower tells us how we can help God's kingdom to grow on earth. The Parable of the Sheep and the Goats tells us how we can bring about the Kingdom of God on earth by helping those in need. When we help others we are helping Jesus.

- Who was Fr Damien of Molokai? Fr Damien of Molokai was a priest who served a community of people with leprosy in Hawaii during the nineteenth century. He was inspired by Jesus' actions to help a marginalised group of people, and his selfless actions mean he is an example to all Christians.
- How can Catholics help refugees today? Since Jesus' time refugees have been marginalized and met with hostility. The Church encourages us to follow the teachings of Jesus and welcome refugees.
