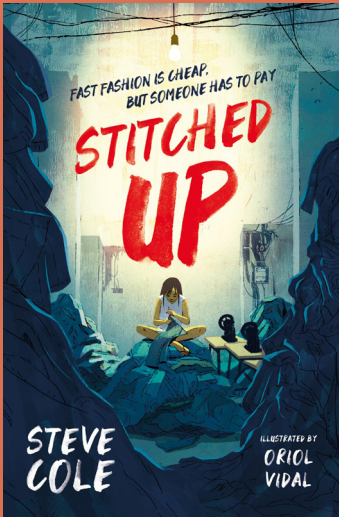

Whatever your child chooses to read, we hope they enjoy it.

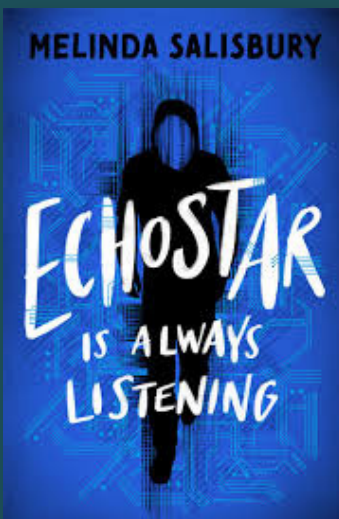
SHORTER-LENGTH READS

**EchoStar is Always Listening**

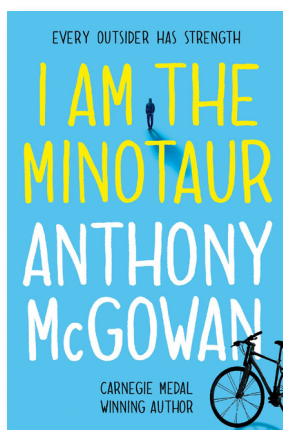
MELINDA SALISBURY

When every day is a struggle to survive, when the rich and powerful hold all the cards... do you accept the way things are? Or do you fight to change them?

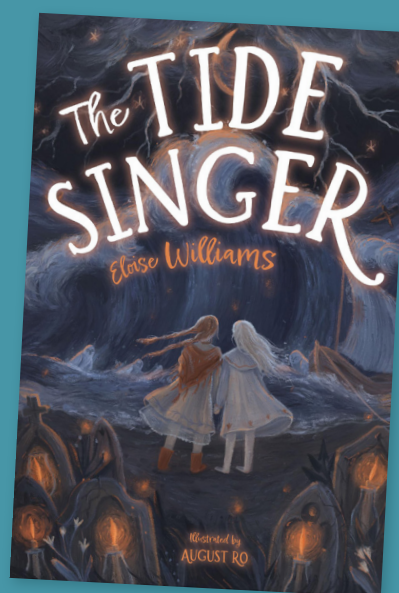

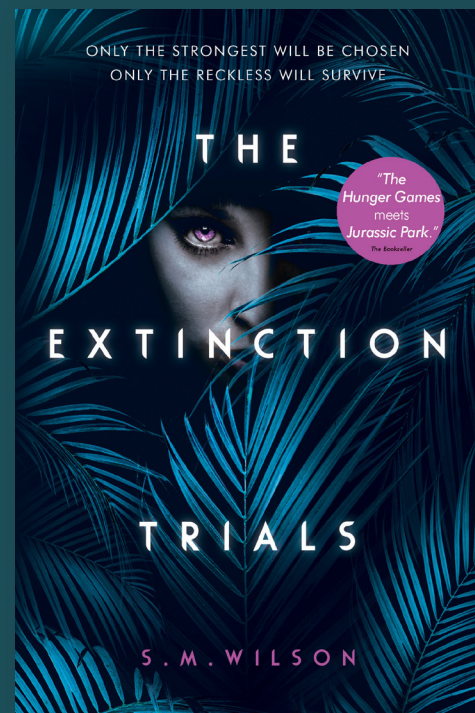


The Extinction Trials

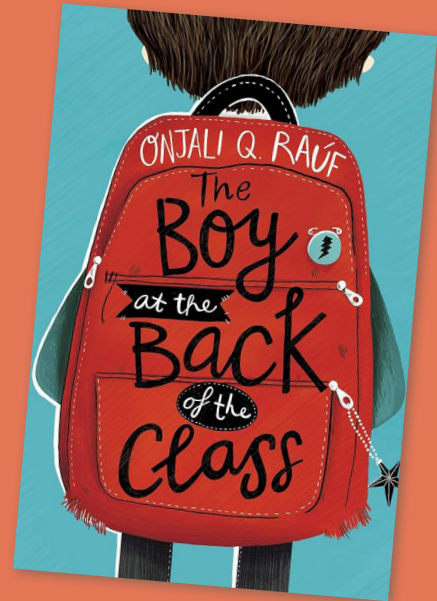

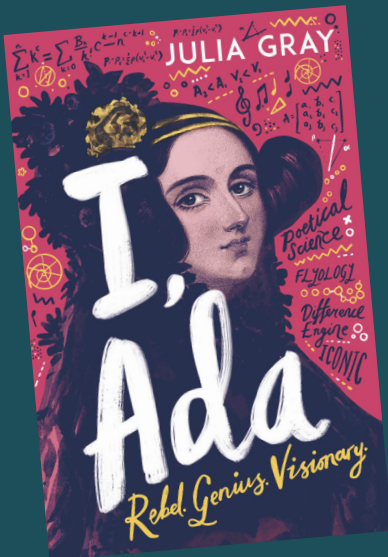
Under a Fire-Red Sky

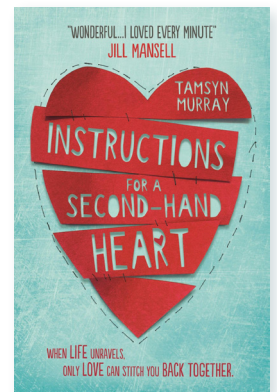


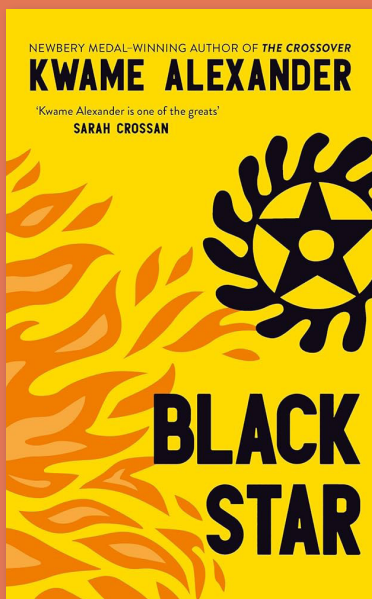
Instructions for a Second-Hand Heart

Mondays Are Murder

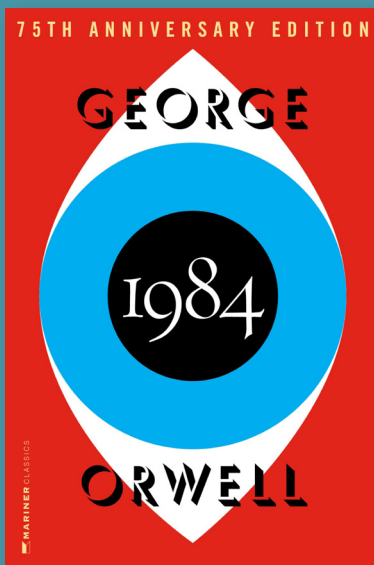

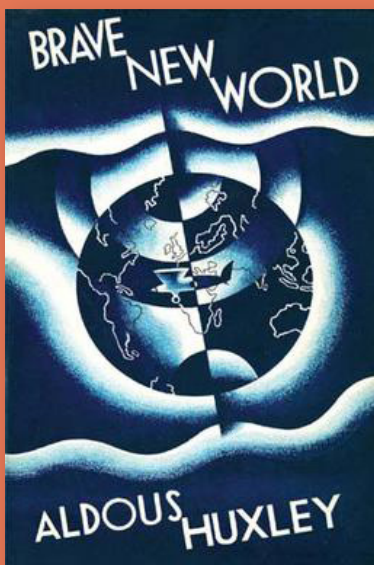


SPOTLIGHT ON A COUPLE OF CLASSICS FOR OLDER READERS (14+):

**Brave New World**

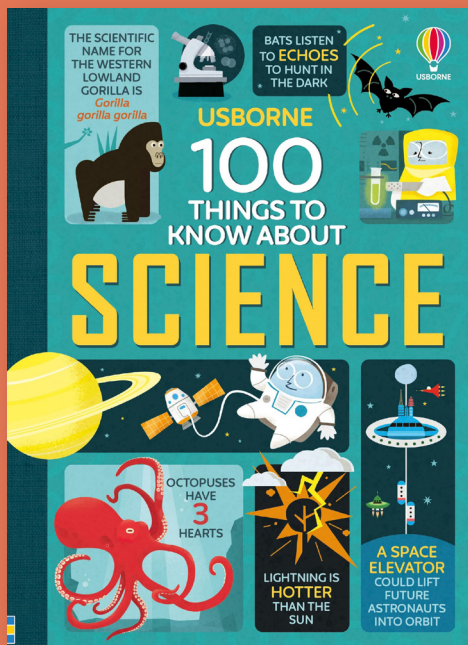
ALDOUS HUXLEY

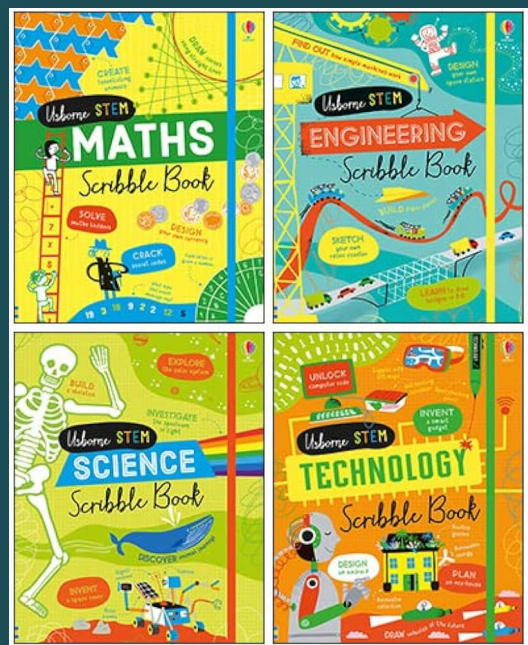
100 Things to Know About Science

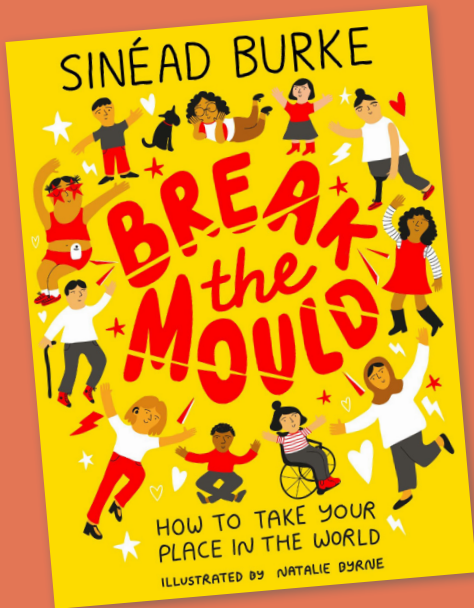

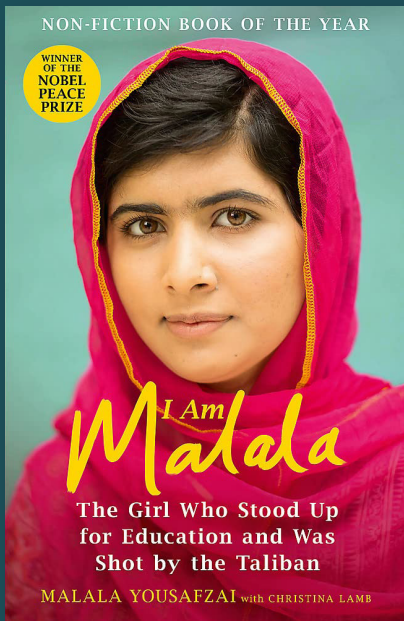
YVETTE FIELDING
